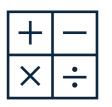

## What did we learn?



- Most students feel welcome and included at school (65.2% Always)
- Many students expressed needing more help with math(20.7% Always/40.9% Sometimes)
- Over half (52.8%) feel they do not need additional support services, though emotional support (26.7%) and vision assistance(15.5%), were noted needs.
- Families are satisfied with communication (75% "Always" understand) and prefer in-person or phone contact.
  - Most (80%) report no extra service needs, though 15% need after-school care and 15.8% have safety concerns.
- Key needs: better neighborhood facilities (5%), food security (5%), and immigrant legal support (up to 5%).



- Staff feel the school is welcoming (80%) and inclusive (55% "Always") but note unmet student needs in emotional support (52.6%) and clothing/shoes (57.9%).
- Most have tools for academic (86.4%) and behavioral (77.3%) issues, fewer for mental health (59.1%).
- Communication is mainly in-person (59.1%) and email (54.5%).



- Most stakeholders say the school "Always" welcomes everyone (68.3%), with strong event participation despite varying attendance.
- Student decision-making opportunities are limited—only a quarter report "Always."
- Inclusion is valued, but perceptions differ on cultural representation in education and the extent of student and family needs.
