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
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## LARGO LOSES A LION

# LARGO HIGH SCHOOL'S NEW PRINCIPAL, MRS. KIMBERLY FORD

## EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW WITH INSIDE THE DEN

During the past few months, Largo High School has faced some drastic changes. One change has been distance learning. Another, and more exciting change, has been getting a new addition to the Largo family. On Tuesday, October 21, 2020, the Inside the Den News reporters had the wonderful opportunity to have a one-on-one with Largo's new Principal, Mrs. Kimberly Ford!

Principal Kimberly Ford grew up in Detroit with dreams of becoming a teacher. In her interview she stated, "When I was little, I always wanted to be a teacher. I always said this to myself growing up." It was a goal that she stuck by. However, living in the inner city of a major metropolitan area where many outsiders judge the public-school system, Mrs. Ford didn't begin her journey in public schools. "I didn't have the opportunity to go to public schools right away. I lived in the inner city, so my mother did her best to keep me and my brother in private school." Her opportunity to attend public school finally came as she entered high school. This is when she "grew the interest to make schools better, which led me towards administration."

Mrs. Ford's childhood prepared her for her current role as a principal, but what working experience led her to Largo High School? Mrs. Ford explained that she had been an assistant principal at Bowie High School in Bowie, Maryland. "As an assistant principal, my previous roles and responsibilities were running the 9th grade building at Bowie High School. I worked in the Annex Building at Bowie High School for the last 8 or 9 years."

well. I have had some communication with parents, and that has been positive also. Sometimes we receive feedback and can get information so that we can make some adjustments, but everybody has received me well. I appreciate all the support that I have gotten so far. I am looking forward to taking advantage of our virtual [opportunity] to meet with as many parents and students as I can."

Her vision for Largo was passionately given as she continued to give her feedback about joining The Den. "My goal for Largo is to have us continue to build upon the success we have already achieved here at Largo. I also want to make sure that our students are being challenged and that teaching and learning is taking place in the classroom as we're preparing our students to be college- and career-ready. In addition, it means that they are receiving instruction that's going to build their critical thinking skills, making sure that they are able to problem-solve, and making sure that they are able to communicate effectively. Also, being able to develop the idea of being a lifelong learner, so that we are all growing."

Virtual learning hasn't slowed down growth in The Den but it's well known that it has been stressful. Even Mrs. Ford has acknowledged this new era of learning as "a challenge" but offers some advice, especially if she were in the shoes of a student. Her first step, 'making sure my class links are up and ready to go. I would constantly check Google Classroom for any upcoming assignments. I would also constantly check Schoolmax to make sure that all the assignments that I did were graded properly."

Another important step in distance learning, she says is involving parents. She credits her mom with consistently working with her

responsibility to observe classrooms, engage her staff members, and use

logistics to put in place structures and systems that would work for her

school. She has expressed great interactions with Largo High

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teachers and made her "self-advocate" more. "Even though I went to school in the '80s, I would still be prepared for distance learning. I had to be prepared because my mother was on me, pushing me to do the best I can. Therefore, she didn't have time for excuses."

"This process of virtual learning has definitely been a challenge but, what it has done [is] pushed our staff and students as well. Students and staff have been pushed to embrace an uncomfortable area and still be able to grow in that space. Even though we've found virtual learning to be difficult, we have to embrace it because this is where we are and through all of this, it's been able to show perseverance in individuals, students and adults alike. We are going to continue to embrace and challenge our students and staff to make sure they are equipped with the tools they need. That's super important and that expectation doesn't go away because of virtual learning."

However, when the time does come to return to Largo, Mrs. Ford has an action plan for the safety of staff and students from Covid-19 in accordance with Prince George's County Public Schools' guidelines. This includes "making sure that there is a small population of students coming into the building." One of the suggestions for hybrid learning from the county is that "students with last names starting from A-G will come to school Monday and Tuesday. Then students from H-Z will come Thursday and Friday. We have to make sure that there is spacing in the classrooms and make sure that there is a plan of action for the lunch schedule." She and the administrative team work daily to plan "where lunches will be, what dismissal from school will be like, how will Largo High School enforce the 6 feet apart guidelines, and transitioning from class to class in the hallways." Safety is her priority for all students and staff members at Largo High School and she assures that "all the things that will be put in place for the safety of the students, will be placed by the Operational Procedures by PGCPS."

Telling us more about her personal life, she opened up and shared with us what she could do as a hobby, all day, nonstop, in a virtual setting: research places to travel. She continued, "I love to travel and my favorite travel website to help plan for a trip is TripAdvisor. I use the site to find deals on island getaways, hotels, and really good places to eat. I actually traveled to a couple of places. I've also been to Caribbean islands such as Jamaica. I have also been on a cruise. If I wasn't an educator [and had] unlimited amounts of money, I would travel for the rest of my life. In addition, I would travel to Africa, Europe and the rest of the Caribbean islands."

Aside from her role as an administrator, getting to know her as a new person in the community took the interview a little off course. Everyone wants to know the woman behind the title of principal. It was asked if she were able to take a year off and write a book, what would the title of the book be and why? After some thought, Mrs. Ford affirmed, "'Succeeding Against the Odds.' I would choose that title because life for me was not easy growing up and there were many challenges that I had to endure. Despite that, I'm still standing, pushing forward and preserving, which is what I encourage students to do as well. Throughout the many struggles that I had to face I was still able to 'succeed against the odds.' Each chapter would go into depth about the various things that I had to endure and how I overcame them."

"For my ninth graders who are coming in with me, I will say that being organized is very important as it indicates that they are engaged in the class sessions. Making sure they ask many questions, there is no such thing as a stupid question. If you don't understand anything, you ask. If nobody is asking questions, you are accountable for yourself, that's why the teacher is there. Don't wait until the end of class to figure it out when the teacher is not there, go ask questions. Even if you don't understand something, just try your best to get through it. I will also say that students have the opportunity to retake some assessments as long as the teacher agrees. Become involved, come to school every day and engage in class lessons without having an excuse. For 12th graders, make sure you're on top of your grades, as it is your last year. Furthermore, make sure that you are actively visiting colleges and taking advantage of virtual tours. If you're not going to school right away but, you're going into some type of career, whatever training it takes such as doing the ASVAB, if a student is going to the military. If you are looking into some tech program where you can get some additional skills, just leave out of Largo being prepared. That is what I want for my 12th graders. When they get to college, I don't want them to say, 'Aw man, this math class is too hard, because I wasn't prepared as I thought I was.' This is the last year, pay attention, don't get senior-itis as it isn't the time to feel like it. We need you to stay focused so, in that way you can end this year successfully with the highest grades you can receive. Also, this should be the time for everyone filling out their FAFSA form and that it is done correctly. Choose something that you are passionate about. This is your last year, so enjoy it. High school is something you can never get back. Enjoy your last year but still be productive. Furthermore, be prepared for what we call the real world."

Inside the Den News greatly enjoyed getting to know the new principal and are thrilled to see what else she has in store for Largo. She gave a front row seat into her new role and her journey as she was welcomed into the Largo High School community. She definitely has much to offer. In the early morning hours of August 13, 2018, in Frederick, Colorado, US, Christopher Lee Watts admitted to killing his two daughters and his pregnant wife. Before admitting to these evil deeds, this story takes a lot of twists and turns. This documentary uses firsthand footage to examine these twists and turns and how they lead to the disappearance of Shanann Watts and her children.

The true crime documentary, American Murder: The Family Next Door, is the latest Netflix sensation. The documentary reveals the story behind Chris Watts killing his wife and two daughters. Fans are hoping that this documentary digs deep into the case. Some consider the case "unique in its savagery". Chris Watts confessed to the murder of his wife, Shanann Cathryn Watts, and their two daughters, Bella and Celeste, on the morning of August. 13, 2018. The documentary consists of assembled archival footage, including his slain wife's social Christopher Lee Watts who admitted to the murdering of his pregnant wife by strangulation and the killing their daughters, by

smothering them in a blanket was pleaded guilty to multiple counts of first degree murder as part of a plea deal. when the death penalty was removed from sentencing, he was sentenced to five life sentences without the possibility of parole, three to be served consequently and two to be served concurrently.
